Lessons from Plants on Human Thriving

Dr. Montgomery will explore the question: "How can plants teach us to be better humans?" She encourages us to consider how insights gathered from plant physiology, phenotypic plasticity, and other plant growth phenomena can help us improve our lives and our society. Genetically identical plants can have very different appearances, metabolisms, and behaviors if the external environments in which they are

growing differ in light or nutrient availability, among other environmental differences. Plants are even capable of transformative behaviors that enable them to maximize their chances of survival in dynamic and sometimes unfriendly environments, while also transforming the environment in which they exist in the process. In this talk, Dr. Montgomery will focus on insights for humans derived from lessons from plants. These lessons focus on how plants achieve their own purposes by following common principles of the universe on thriving and resilience as individuals and in communities.

Beronda L. Montgomery, PhD, is a writer, science communicator, and plant biologist. For more than 20 years as a professor, her primary laboratory-based research has been focused on the responses of photosynthetic organisms (i.e., plants and cyanobacteria) to external light cues. Additionally, she pursues the theme of how organisms perceive and respond to their environment in the context of effective mentoring and leadership of individuals, and the role of innovative leaders in supporting success. Dr. Montgomery has been named one of the journal *Cell's* Inspiring Black Scientists in America and was awarded the 2021 Cynthia Westcott Science Writing Award, 2022 Adolph E. Gude, Jr. Award for outstanding service to the science of plant biology, and 2023 Hutchinson Medal of the Chicago Horticultural Society. She is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Society of Plant Biologists, the American Society for Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, and the American Academy of Microbiology. In 2025, she was named recipient of a Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics and Engineering Mentoring, the Nation's highest honors for mentors. Dr. Montgomery is author of *Lessons from Plants* (Harvard University Press, 2021) and *When Trees Testify* (forthcoming from Holt in January 2026).

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE





In April and May you might see our native West Virginia White butterfly (Pieris virginiensis*) and think it's an early Cabbage White (Pieris rapae), its pesky invasive European cousin. Look carefully, a West Virginia White does not have the black dots on its wings that the Cabbage White does and appears briefly starting in early spring. Unlike the Cabbage White, the West Virginia White has been in decline for some time and is listed as "vulnerable" in New York State. Its habitat is woods, so urbanization is a factor, but the primary culprit is another invasive pest, Garlic Mustard (Alliaria petiolata), also from Europe, first reported in the US in 1868 on Long Island.

West Virginia White larvae can survive on only two of our native plants, Cardamines (Dentarias) diphylla and laciniata, aka Toothwart. Unfortunately, female West Virginia Whites mistake Garlic Mustard for Cardamine and lay their eggs on it. Both plants are in the mustard family but Garlic Mustard is

toxic to West Virginia White larvae. Toothwart leaves and tubers, btw, are edible by humans—Native Americans both ate them for food and used the tubers as medicine.

So you've been doing your part for our native pollinators by removing Garlic Mustard all these years. But another thing you might do—that I can vouch for working—to give you an early crop of butterflies, is plant Cardamine. I will be bringing Cardamine diphylla plants from my garden to be sold in the "digs" section at the HAH Garden Fair, May 16-17 if you're interested. Toothwart is a charming spring ephemeral with pretty dark green leaves and bracts of delicate white flowers.

HAH 2025 HONOREE, Jackson Dodds, an East End native, has been spending time amongst the trees and plants of the Hamptons for as long as he can remember. Jackson began his career at a local tree company and at age 18 was recognized as the youngest Certified Arborist in New York State. He graduated magna cum laude from Farmingdale State College with degrees in landscape design and turf management, and a minor in business. A past President of the

Long Island Arboricultural Association, he continues to be a steward for the responsible growth of the tree care and landscaping industry on Eastern Long Island. He founded Jackson Dodds & Company, Inc. in 2011.

Community minded, Jackson has played a significant role in supporting the Long Pond Greenbelt, a vital ecological preserve. His environmental advocacy has supported habitat restoration and educational programs. Jackson Dodds and Company were on the forefront of adopting electric-powered equipment, reducing emissions and minimizing noise pollution. Jackson put his tree knowledge to work while saving a historic elm tree in East Hampton through pruning and cabling. As a long-time member and supporter of the Horticultural Alliance, Jackson has lead workshops dating back to the early 2000's. His tool maintenance workshop is still being talked about and his tree pruning workshops are always filled to capacity, educating and delighting us. When called upon, Jackson has always been willing to donate his time
